As I sit down to write this, Election Day is only a few weeks away. And I, for one, will be glad to see it go.

This has been an especially divisive political season. Partisan passions have run high for well over a year now. And sadly, the political rift in our nation seems to run right through some of our churches, where some folks will only worship with those who see things their own way. And so, even in the church, to some extent at least, we can find ourselves divided by our politics.

In all this, it's easy to forget our baptism, the sign and the source of our unity. The Book of Ephesians reminds us that there is only one baptism—and only one church—because there is only one God of us all. And baptism suggests that belonging to the church is a lot more like belonging to a family than like belonging to a political party. We do not all have to agree. We do not all have to vote the same way or support the same candidates or champion the same causes. Because there is only one baptism, because there is only one church, we all belong to each other, whether we agree with each other or not, whether we like each other or not. In Christ, we are one.

In a nation so divided by partisan politics, what if we in the church could rediscover our oneness in Christ? Liberals and conservatives, Democrats and Republicans, Green Party members and Libertarians, we all share one God, one baptism, one faith, one church. What if we could reclaim this unity? What if we could remember that, through Christ, we belong to one another?

Labor Day

The totals for the Labor Day food stand are as follows: the net was \$3,329.14 with \$832.29 (25% of net) going to Greater Love, for a balance of **\$2,496.85** to be deposited into the general checking account. GREAT JOB, CHURCH!!

10/2 Neighbors in Need justice and compassion offering. This is the 3rd of 4 national UCC special offerings. 1/3 supports the Council for American Indian Ministry; 2/3 is used by UCC Justice and Witness Ministries for justice initiatives and direct service projects through grants. St. Paul's is a 5-for-5 church. <u>First</u>, OCWM (Our Churches' Wider Mission) basic support for State Conferences and National UCC ministries <u>plus 4</u> special offerings throughout the year for vital ministries involving clergy-in-need and pensions; international disaster/emergency relief, health, education, and agricultural development; youth ministries and "new church" leadership; justice and witness ministries.

10/16, 23, 30 Stewardship Emphasis time is an opportunity to share our faith stories, recognize what membership/participation at St. Paul's means to us, understand how the blessings we have been given teach us about our own need to give and serve.



Test of Faith

We are all on this journey of life and we never quite know how it will all turn out. Every day is a test and we don't know if we passed or not. We make plans and as we get older, our experience helps us determine if our plan will work out in our favor or if we need to adjust. Faith, for me, plays a big part in those plans, always asking for guidance and direction.

Often our lives are going well and we take for granted all the good things. We forget that God is there with us. As soon as something bad happens, we wonder where God is and why he left us. I have heard many times "why has God forsaken me?"

There is so much to my story of faith as it is for so many. Raising your children is sometime the most challenging as well as the biggest gift of joy. You raise them to know the difference between right and wrong, establish morals, standards and setting the right example so they grow up to be responsible, productive and compassionate members of society. You step back and take a look, asking for guidance along the way and believe you are doing a great job.

My oldest son, Andrew, had everything going for him. Doing well in school, being responsible and was a joy to be around. He was very easy going and well loved by so many. The last semester of his senior year, things started to change. He became very irritable, little patience and angry. I tried to get him to talk with no luck. We all have been educated to know the signs of drugs and get that sinking feeling but quickly turn it off and go to the thoughts of "my child would never, there must be something else going on". Time went on and things got worse, I didn't know what to do. I didn't know how to fix it. I prayed for the right words to say and the right actions to take.....nothing happened. God, please help me! What I have learned through my journey is that we don't always pray the right way; we don't know what our prayer should be.....our prayer seems to be unanswered. Why is this all happening to me? Turns out, it's not about me. After a couple of years of complete despair and one year of not knowing if Andrew as dead or alive......I prayed a different prayer. God, please wrap your arms around Andrew, let him know you are there, fill his heart with your love and let him feel you. The other very simple prayer was, Please bring him home....to me.....orto You, keep him safe. That prayer was very hard, because I knew what it meant. Not too long after that prayer, the phone call came......from jail, Andrew had been arrested. I knew then he was off the street and for the most part safe. He was there for 10 days, he was let out with nothing......to walk the streets. He called me and I picked him up next to a garbage can in a parking lot. He was a mess.....but God answered my prayer. He was there with me always, giving me the strength and the courage to do what I had to do, even though that meant to let go. It was like God picked up Andrew and brought it home to me. God trusted me enough to send him back to me. He has been with me and has been with Andrew helping him all the way to clean and sober

Bad things don't happen to good people; it's all a test of faith. There is nothing we can't handle as long as we know that God is there to comfort, love and guide us. We are never alone; he always knows what we need even if we don't.

I love St Paul's Church family because, through Pastor Mary Beth, she helps us know that our prayers, whether it's a grunt a groan, tears or joy, God knows our heart and is there with us no matter what. My faith and love for God is never a test, I just know and love that he is on my side.
